DfE is working with the Scientific Advisory Group for Emergencies (SAGE) and NHS England on a pilot project to measure CO2 levels in classrooms and exploring options to help improve ventilation in settings where needed.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Open windows fully when rooms are unoccupied for longer periods to purge the air (e.g. lunch times and before and after school).</li> <li>● Action taken to prevent occupants being exposed to draughts. For example, partially open high-level windows as oppose to low-level windows, close external doors and arrange the furniture if appropriate and possible.</li> <li>● Use fans for good air circulation.</li> <li>● Air conditioning systems that normally run with a recirculation mode set up to run on full outside air.</li> <li>● Ventilation’s system that removes and recirculates air to different rooms is turned off.</li> <li>● Ventilation system remains on at all times, even when the building is unoccupied. The system set to operate at lower ventilation rates during evenings and weekends.</li> <li>● Occupants encouraged to wear additional, suitable indoor clothing. <b>Maintain appropriate cleaning regimes</b>		
<p>You should put in place and maintain an appropriate cleaning schedule.</p>	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● <i>Reduced clutter and removing difficult to clean items to make cleaning easier.</i></li> <li>● <i>Cleaning using standard cleaning products such as detergents and bleach, paying attention to all surfaces but especially ones that are touched frequently, such as door handles, light switches, work surfaces, remote controls and electronic devices.</i></li> <li>● <i>Surfaces that are frequently touched and by many people in common areas to be cleaned twice a day.</i></li> <li>● <i>Avoid sharing work equipment by allocating it on a personal basis or put cleaning regimes in place to clean between each user.</i></li> <li>● <i>Identify where you can reduce people touching surfaces, for example by leaving doors open (except fire doors) or providing contactless payment.</i></li> <li>● <i>Keep surfaces clear to make it easier to clean and reduce the likelihood of contaminating objects.</i></li> <li>● <i>Provide more bins and empty them more often.</i></li> <li>● <i>Toilets and communal areas to be cleaned regularly, with a process of recording – displaying cleaning schedules.</i></li> <li>● <i>Sanitising spray and paper towels to be provided in classrooms for use by members of staff. If using cloths – disposable or appropriate washing and drying process.</i></li> </ul> <p><i>Thorough cleaning of rooms at the end of the day. 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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>● Frequent and thorough hand cleaning is regular practice.</li> <li>● Pupils and staff to clean their hands when they arrive at school, when they return from breaks, when they change rooms and before and after eating.</li> <li>● Sufficient handwashing facilities are available.</li> <li>● Where there is no sink, hand sanitiser provided in classrooms.</li> <li>● Skin friendly skin cleaning wipes used as an alternative to hand washing or sanitiser.</li> <li>● Staff help is available for pupils who have trouble cleaning their hands independently (e.g. small children and pupils with complex needs).</li> <li>● Use resources such as “e-bug” to teach effective hand hygiene etc.</li> <li>● Adults and pupils are encouraged not to touch their mouth, eyes and nose.</li> <li>● Adults and pupils encouraged to use a tissue to cough or sneeze and use bins for tissue waste (‘catch it, bin it, kill it’).</li> <li>● Tissues to be provided.</li> <li>● Bins for tissues provided and are emptied throughout the day.</li> </ul> <p><b>Respiratory hygiene</b></p> <p>The ‘catch it, bin it, kill it’ approach continues to be very important. Records maintained of outcomes.</i></p> <p><i>Lateral Flow tests are for routine testing of asymptomatic individuals. It does not rule out Covid if a person has typical symptoms. <b>Dealing with confirmed case/ cases and outbreak.</b>	<p><b>Case (possible vs confirmed case)</b></p> <p>Possible: anyone with either a high temperature, a new, continuous cough or a loss of, or change to, your sense of smell or taste</p> <p>Confirmed: LFT test positive case of COVID-19 with or without to all parents in a class symptoms.</p> <p>For asymptomatic positive LFT results, confirmatory PCR tests are to be temporarily suspended from Tuesday 11 January. This will mean that anyone who receives a positive LFT test result will be required to self-isolate immediately and will not be required to take a confirmatory PCR test.</p>	
<b>Who to Isolate</b>	<p><b>Possible case:</b> (Isolate and send home to take a LFT test if still at your setting) if they have a new continuous cough and/or high temperature and/or a loss of, or change in, normal sense of taste or smell (anosmia)</p> <p><b>Confirmed case:</b> LFT</p> <p><b>Partially or unvaccinated close contacts Aged over 18 years and 6 months of age (unless medically exempt from vaccination)</b></p> <p>10 days isolation from onset of symptoms (or positive test if asymptomatic). You can take an LFT test from 6 days after the day your symptoms started (or the day your test was taken if you did not have symptoms), and another LFT test on the following day. The second LFT test should be taken at least 24 hours later. If both these test results are negative, and you do not have a high temperature, you may end your self-isolation after the second negative test result. These LFT results should be reported to the NHS here <a href="https://www.gov.uk/report-a-covid-19-rapid-lateral-flow-test-result">Report a COVID-19 rapid lateral flow test result - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</a> 2 x consecutive negative LFDs are required 24 hours apart to end isolation before the 10 days period.</p> <p>In the case of a close contact for unvaccinated adult – self-isolate 10 days from last contact with a case</p>	

<p><b>Close Contact requirements</b></p>	<p><b>NHS Test and Trace will interview cases and will contact individuals who have had close contact where they have contact details</b> to let them know that they have been identified as a contact and check whether they are legally required to self-isolate.</p> <p>If you are a fully vaccinated (two doses) and a contact of someone who tested positive for Covid, you do not have to self-isolate, but should take daily <b>lateral flow tests (LFTs)</b> for seven days. This also applies to people under the age of 18 years and six months.</p> <p>Close contacts of a positive case who are <b>not</b> double-jabbed have to isolate for the full 10 days immediately</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The school should continue to support the identification of staff-to-staff close contacts and establish vaccination status to ascertain whether self-isolation is required.</li> </ul> <p style="text-align: center;">-</p> <p>Individuals identified as close contacts are not required to self-isolate if any of the following apply:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• they are <b>fully vaccinated</b> (e.g. at least 2 weeks after second dose)</li> </ul> <p>they are below the age of <b>18 years and 6 months</b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• they have taken part in or are currently part of an approved COVID-19 vaccine trial</li> <li>• they are not able to get vaccinated for medical reasons</li> </ul> <p>Close contacts who are not required to isolate will be advised to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• take a PCR test (do not need to isolate whilst awaiting result but will need to isolate as a case if positive)</li> <li>• limit close contact with others outside their household</li> <li>• wear a face covering in enclosed spaces</li> <li>• limit contact with clinically extremely vulnerable</li> </ul> <p>participate in twice weekly LFT testing if eligible</p>	<p>GS</p> <p><i>Letter going out to all parents in a class when a positive PCR test in that class, asking all to carry out a daily LFT for 10 days.</i></p>
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	<p>Close contacts who are not required to isolate will be advised to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• take daily lateral flow (do not need to isolate whilst testing but will need to isolate as a case if positive)</li> <li>• limit close contact with others outside their household</li> <li>• wear a face covering in enclosed spaces</li> <li>• limit contact with clinically extremely vulnerable</li> </ul>	
Cases -staff	<p>Schools no longer routinely need to report contacts to the self-isolation hub where cases are able to identify these to NHS test and trace. However, to support staff to access support payments this may still be necessary if self-isolation is needed and cases are not able to identify close contacts to NHS Test and Trace (e.g., temporary staff, supply contractors etc who may not have contact details of people in school).</p> <p>Schools should report <b>only</b> these to the <b>NHS Test and Trace self-isolation hub on 0203 7436715</b>. NHS Test and Trace will follow-up directly with contacts to provide testing and isolation advice. You will need to have the <b>8-digit CTAS number</b> sent to your positive case / member of staff</p>	GS/All Staff
Self-Isolation rules (SI)	<p>Since Wednesday 22 December, the 10-day self-isolation period for people who test positive for COVID-19 can in some cases be reduced. Individuals may take an LFT test from 6 days after the day symptoms started (or the day your test was taken if did not have symptoms), and another LFT test on the following day.</p> <p>The second LFT test should be taken at least 24 hours later. If both these test results are negative, and do not have a high temperature, you may end your self-isolation after the second negative test result. LFT tests should be reported to the NHS <a href="#">here</a> Staff ending SI on day 7 after 2 x negative LFTs, should also report that they have had 2 negative LFTs to the school.</p> <p>Individuals should not take an LFT test before the sixth day of isolation period, and should only end your self-isolation after you have had 2 consecutive negative LFT tests which should be taken at least 24 hours apart. Individuals should stop testing after 2 consecutive negative test results or after 10 days whichever is sooner.</p> <p>This applies to all adults and children of all ages, including under 5s, with LFT testing at parental or guardian discretion.</p>	GS/all staff

Self Isolation Calculation	<p>It is important that schools consider the following Government guidance ( <a href="#">Stay at home: guidance for households with possible or confirmed coronavirus (COVID-19) infection - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</a> states, to further reduce the chance of passing COVID-19 on to others, staff who end their self-isolation period before 10 full days they are <b>strongly</b> advised:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"><li>● to limit close contact with other people outside your household, especially in crowded, enclosed or poorly ventilated spaces</li><li>● to work from home if you are able to</li><li>● in addition to venues where it is a legal requirement, to wear a face covering in crowded, enclosed or poorly ventilated spaces and where you are in close contact with other people</li><li>● to limit contact with anyone who is at higher risk of severe illness if infected with COVID-19</li><li>● to follow the <a href="#">guidance on how to stay safe and help prevent the spread</a></li></ul> <p>Providing they have 2 x negative LFTs on day 6 and then day 7 24 hours apart, and the day 7 test is before attending school they can return on day 7. In terms of the 2 x negative tests – it is 2 x consecutive negative tests 24 hours apart, so if positive on day 7, but negative on day 8 and day 9 then you would end isolation there.</p> <p>As the LFTs pick up current infection and people can be reinfected, the guidance now says once you have ended 10-day isolation regular asymptomatic testing can start again – and no longer wait 90 days.</p>	
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Cases- pupils	<p>Children who are unwell should <b>not</b> attend the setting and should remain at home until their acute symptoms resolve (+24 hours for a fever).</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• <b>IF</b> these symptoms develop into cough, temperature, changes to taste and smell, should isolate and test.</li> <li>• <b>IF</b> test negative to COVID-19, still need to remain at home until at least 24 fever free and acute symptoms resolved.</li> </ul> <p><b>Parents and settings should not try and ‘second guess’ diagnosis – if have the key symptoms, isolate and test.</b></p> <p><i>Examples of acute symptoms with which children should not attend school/nursery include fever, muscle aches, hacking cough.</i></p> <p>Follow public health advice on managing confirmed cases of COVID-19 see <a href="https://www.gov.uk/guidance/schools-covid-19-operational-guidance">Schools COVID-19 operational guidance - GOV.UK (www.gov.uk)</a></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Ensure the case isolates for 10 days</li> <li>• Household of the case isolates for 10 days (unless fully vaccinated or aged under 18 years and 6 months)</li> <li>• If positive case came from an LFD test, case should take a confirmatory PCR test within 48hrs of the LFD</li> </ul>	GS
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	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Following a pupil PCR positive NHS Test and Trace will speak to the case (or parent/carer) to identify close contacts and advice on isolation as required and to get a PCR test</li> <li>• Staff and pupils who do not need to isolate should continue to attend school as normal</li> <li>• Clean and disinfect rooms the case was in, using appropriate PPE</li> <li>• Case and any isolating contacts can return once isolation period is completed, as long as they are well</li> </ul> <p><b>Escalation criteria:</b> If you have any infection control concerns or questions call the DfE Coronavirus helpline on 0800 046 8687 for advice. If your setting meets the following thresholds for extra action (outlined in the Contingency Framework), the DfE helpline will escalate to the SW PHE Health Protection Team when a risk assessment is required. DCC Public Health Team can also assist.</p>	
Case Thresholds	<p><b><u>For most education and childcare settings:</u></b></p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• 5 children, pupils, students or staff, <u>who are likely to have mixed closely</u>, test positive for COVID-19 within a 10-day period.</li> <li>• 10% of children, pupils, students or staff <u>who are likely to have mixed closely</u> test positive for COVID-19 within a 10-day period.</li> <li>• There are any admissions to hospital for COVID-19.</li> <li>• You are having problems implementing the control measures <b>OR</b> you have applied the control measures and are still seeing a significant rise in cases.</li> </ul>	<p><i>Covid Management Plan in place and updated and actioned as required.</i></p> <p>GS</p>
Contingency framework and outbreak control measures	<p>Schools are required to update their contingency plan (or outbreak management plan) and describe how they will respond if children, pupils, or staff test positive for COVID-19, how they will operate if they are advised to reintroduce any measures to help break chains of transmission.
